

Behaviour: Why is my rabbit doing that?




Rubbing chin on things
Rabbits have a scent gland under

in, belongs to them.




Running and Jumping

and others race around like crazy.




Eating Poop


Rabbits look really odd when they yawn! They stretch to warm their muscles up after a nap and then open their mouths really wide and show you all their teeth.




Flopping over on to side
Happy and relaxed rabbits
sometimes like to sleep on their
sides. They'll do a dramatic flop-roll
to get into a comfortable position. If
they are very enthusiastic - they may
roll all the way over.



Carrying Hay
Female rabbits gather hay in their
mouths to build a nest for babies.
Sometimes they nest build without
being pregnant, and, occasionally,
male rabbits build nests too!



Stamping Feet
Rabbits stamp their feet to warn their
friends and family that they've heard
or seen something they think is
dangerous. It's a signal for the whole
group to run for cover.



Digging at people
If your rabbit digs at your feet or
clothing it usually means they want
you to move. It's best not to obey,
otherwise they'll dig at you every time
they want you to do something.
